



The City of Spokane recently adopted the <u>South Logan TOD Plan and Final Environmental Impact Statement</u>. The TOD Plan looked at allowing for improved mixed-use and walkable places in the Logan area, specifically along STA's new bus rapid transit route, the City Line. The Final Environmental Impact Statement looks at the preferred development alternative and identifies impacts and mitigation strategies regarding expected development over the next 20 years. Both plans were informed via comprehensive neighborhood and community partner engagement.



About 40% of the Logan neighborhood sits within the designated University District Revitalization Area (UDRA) boundaries. The neighborhood is situated close to downtown Spokane and is one of the oldest residential neighborhoods in the city, platted and developed between 1884 and 1890 by Sylvester and Ida Heath and the Jesuits of Gonzaga College.

As a federal census tract, the Logan neighborhood is designated as a severely distressed area. The median household income is \$50,000 - \$74,999, approximately 15% of the households are led by a single parent, and just over 68% of the neighborhood is renter-occupied (a good portion of which can be attributed to student housing). The section east of North Perry Street was historically red-lined due to the federal Home Owner's Loan Corporation designation of the area as a high mortgage risk in the 1930s and 40s.

Many of the South Logan recommendations (see map below) overlap with the <u>U Vision 2044 strategic development priorities</u> adopted by the UDDA Board in November of last year. Some of the highlights from South Logan are the following:


- Streamlined zoning to promote pedestrian-oriented development along the Hamilton Corridor
- Zoning changes to encourage new housing near City Line stops
- Look to study improved multimodal river crossings
- Enhanced walking/rolling crossings of Hamilton Street
- Green street improvements
- Improved riverfront open space and public access

The next steps for the South Logan Project are to implement a Planned

Action Ordinance; update the City Development Code, citywide; adopt a Hamilton Form-Based Code; and land use and zone changes in 2024.

The UD is excited to see this plan adopted and looks forward to seeing increased investment that supports the overall health and well-being of the existing neighborhood and its residents. Stay tuned as this important, community-informed project moves forward.


# Expo '74: 50 Years of Environmental Justice in the Inland Northwest April 12
